SCHOOL ATTENDANCE MATTERS, INCREASES STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

What has the most impact on student achievement? Teacher effectiveness will arguably remain the strongest school-related determinant of student success, but chronic student absenteeism reduces even the best teacher's ability to provide learning opportunities. In short, if a student is not present, not even the best educators can teach them. Therefore, students who attend school regularly will be more successful and achieve at higher levels than students who do not have consistent attendance or are tardy frequently.



"School attendance has shown to be a key indicator significantly correlated with high school graduation," said Ricky Medina, Ph.D., director of accountability and assessment for the Carson City School District. "The effects of lost school days build up one absence at a time with individual students. The best way to counteract that is to build up regular attendance, one day at a time and to help parents and families unify with schools and understand the importance and overall impact of missing school." Carine and Wilke-McCulloch were acknowledged for their dedication to education and the children of the Carson City School District.

Carine served a total of six years on the board after being appointed to the position in 2016. He elected to not run again when his term ended this year. Wilke-McCulloch, served multiple terms spanning multiple years, this being her final year before being termed out of the position.

We welcome **Matt Clapham**, who will take the District 3 seat being vacated by Stacie Wilke-McCulloch and **Molly Walt**, who was elected to take the District 6 seat vacated by Don Carine. Richard Varner and Lupe Ramirez were also re-elected to their positions of District 4 and District 1, respectively.

EVMS ROBOTICS TEAMS EARN PERFORMANCE AND BREAKTHROUGH AWARDS

The after-school robotics program at Eagle Valley Middle School (EVMS) was recently recognized for earning the **Robot Performance Award** and the **Breakthrough Award** at the FIRST LEGO League Qualifier at Trainer Middle School in Reno earlier this month. Three robotics teams had an opportunity to showcase their skill and talent in a friendly competition against 22 other teams from middle schools across northern Nevada Saturday, Dec. 3, 2022. They were judged in four categories: The Robot Game, Core Values, Innovation Project and Gracious Professionalism.





EVMS's Robotics Team 1 earned an outstanding 250 points in the Robot Game and took home the Robot Performance Award. Team 1 surpassed the second-place

Empire Elementary School's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Teacher <u>Adrienne Wiggins</u> was honored Oct. 11, 2022, as one of the five statewide finalists for the Nevada Teacher of the Year, recognized by the Nevada Department of Education.

Ms. Wiggins was surprised during the school's morning faculty meeting where the announcement was made via Zoom. Ultimately, Connie Hall of the Lloyd Diedrichsen Elementary School in the Washoe County School District was named the 2023 Nevada Teacher of the Year.

Out of the 17 school districts in the state of Nevada, the Carson City School District has had teachers represented as a top five finalist for the last five years running, including

the following: 2023 – Adrienne Wiggins, 2022 – Rachel Croft, 2021 – Christina Bourne, 2020 – Nick Jacques and 2019 – Joanna Kaiser. Three Carson City educators were highlighted as presenters at the Nevada State Teachers of the Year's (NVSTOY) Early Career Educator Leadership Conference October 14 and 15, 2022.

Lacey Carey, instructional coach for the Carson City School District, Joanna Kaiser, GATE implementation specialist for the Carson City School District and Nicole Witkowski, music educator at Fritsch Elementary School, presented uplifting and actionable professional learning designed



specifically for Nevada educators early in their careers (third through sixth year of teaching).

The free virtual conference offered professional and personal practices that help make teaching a joyful and fulfilling career. The presentations focused primarily on three concepts: <u>communication</u> (building relationships with and expanding advocacy for students, families and educators), <u>self-care</u> (actively preserving or improving physical, mental and emotional well-being) and <u>reflective practice</u> (learning from experience and actions to improve outcomes). <u>Read more</u> about each presenter.

EMPIRE ELEMENTARY EDUCATORS AWARDED \$5,000 ROTARY GRANT

Empire Elementary, a Governor designated Science,

Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) school, got a big boost from the Noon Rotary Club of Carson City. The club awarded its annual Rotary Education Grant to Instructional Coach Laura Ricks and Third Grade Teacher Nancy Cole. The \$5,000 in grant money will fund an Integrated Math Knowledge Project.



The money will allow Ricks and Cole to purchase math-based reading materials for its Lending Library. The library provides resources teachers use to help individual or groups of students gain a better grasp of multiple subjects. "Our lending library has a lot to offer in the areas of literature, social studies and science. But we have a huge gap in books about math," she said. "As a STEM school, it's important that teachers have access to more math resources to help their students. I truly believe our students will benefit from these books, and we will see the results in higher test scores later in the school year." Read more.


STUDENTS PARTAKE IN "LOVE IT OR LOSE IT" LUNCH MENU EVENTS




SENIOR SPOTLIGHTS FEATURED ON THE DISTRICT WEBSITE

MATH WEEK DESIGNED TO CHANGE THE WAY MATH IS EXPERIENCED


